Advanced vehicles to service new specialised law enforcement unit.



A fleet of 30 new highly powered vehicles, fitted with incredible technological advancements will be used in a soon to be established specialised law enforcement unit within the Department of Community Safety and Transport Management. The special unit which will deal specifically with monitoring compliance and enforcing the law on all major roads in the province on a 24 hour/ 7 day basis.

MEC Sello Lehari made the announcement at the handover event in Mahikeng and says the unit will be launched in August 2023.

"The department has made a commitment to ensure that the safety of our people remains a priority. The vehicles will enable us to effectively deal with lawlessness on our roads, particularly on those that have proven to be hotspots of fatalities.

"They will enable our law enforcement officials to patrol the national roads and also ensure that visibility in increased," said MEC Lehari.

The MEC also took the opportunity to welcome 51 new traffic official recruits who completed their Diplomas in Road Traffic Management in December last year., through the department's learnership programme.

"I am impressed with the level of discipline that our new recruits have displayed, from the first day of their training to the last. Their determination will significantly improve the quality of our law enforcement, this is a part of an effort to build a capable and well resourced law enforcement," said MEC Lehari.











Renovations at Mogwase Service Centre nearing completion



Residents in the Moses Kotane Local Municipality will soon benefit from a newly refurbished three in one traffic service centre, making it easier to access services at a convenience. The centre which will in the near future meet a 100% servicing capacity of Driving Licence and Testing Centre (DLTC), a Registering Authority (RA) and a Vehicle Testing Centre (VTC) all in the same vicinity.

The project forms part of government plans to take services to the public and closer to their residential areas in order to grow local economies. The station is also expected to service over 40 villages in and around the local municipality perimeter. The Director for Transport Administration and Licensing, Mr Seubel Mmono says the refurbishment of the centre will improve the overall provision of services in the Bojanala District.

"The centre will now go through a practical completion and we look forward to the total completion of the project. To finalise everything within the stipulated time so as to ensure that all is above board, that the building is ready to be occupied and for the public to receive services."Given the increase in demand of services in the district, this centre will offload from the Rustenburg centre and people of Moses Kotane will




no longer have to travel a distance to be able to renew their vehicle discs and do their driver license testing," said Mmono.

The centre promises to offer unique services encompassing of traditional means as well as new computerised system. The DLTC Management Representative, Ms Mmoniemang Makhubela says the centre will have capacity to do both."The current fixes to the facility will allow us to accommodate a higher number of clients.

The project site was handed over in late December 2021 for renovations and repairs. The launch and handover is expected within the 2023/24 financial year.

Increased awareness on the plight of people living with disabilities.



The Department of Community Safety and Transport Management as well as the Madibeng Local Municipality have directed efforts towards creating awareness around persons with disabilities and the challenges they face as road users.

Accessing public places especially as pedestrians, passengers or motorists can be challenging for persons with disabilities which prompts careful consideration as well necessary support by the public as a whole.

In celebration on Global Road Safety Week; which is observed every other year, the Department along with stakeholders refurbished designated parking bays and pedestrian crossings in and around Brits, in an effort to make them easily identifiable as well as to improve access to transport, social services, healthcare and other

government services.

The Bojanala District Director, Mr Sipho Maduma, says highlighting the plight of the vulnerable people in society is part of road safety education which is aimed at influencing road user behaviour."Many people do not understand the kind of challenges that one faces when for instance when their mobility, eyesight, speech is limited.

People tend to use designated parking bays that are not meant for them, this adds on to the existing challenges that a person with a disability already has."Through this campaign we have lobbied our social partners to raise awareness and educate people on being more mindful of others when using and accessing roads.

This initiative, we believe will ultimately have a huge impact on reducing road accidents and fatalities," said Mr Maduma.

The Community Safety and Transport Management, has once again mobilised different stakeholders around Naledi Local Municipality using the District Development Model (DDM) to visit the informal settlement area of Phola Park in a door to door visit and targeted forty (40) households.

MEC Lehari led crime and violence intervention Imbizo in Tlhabane



The MEC for the Department of Community Safety and Transport Management, Sello Lehari led the anticrime Imbizo in Tlhabane in Rustenburg Municipality.

The recently released Fourth (4th) Quarter Crime Statistics indicated that Rustenburg stands at position seven for all the crimes reported to the police in the first three months of 2023.

Bojanala District of which Rustenburg is the biggest conurbation has recorded 41% of the total crime stats in the Province and the city had 10.3% more than the previous quarter. For the quarter, Tlhabane and Phokeng had reported 1 180 crime incidents and these are only those reported at the police.

It was for this reason that MEC Lehari led the Anticrime Imbizo in Tlhabane."What worries more is the ever rising figures of robberies, car hijackings, residential breaking-ins, domestic violence and gender based violence", said MEC Lehari.

Most of the crime incidents seemingly emanate from alcohol selling premises like taverns and often both victim and perpetrator know each other.

As part of ensuring that there is a holistic approach to fighting crime, MEC Lehari will lead the Department in variety of activities. These include search and seizure, joint law enforcement operations, oversight visits to assess the police stations, analyse resource allocation as well as the capacity and ability of these stations to service their communities.

Communities are also encouraged to work together with relevant authorities in their areas and engage the Civilian Secretariat Chief Directorate of the Department if they are unhappy with processes of cases.











TKC Inter - Provincial Joint Law Enforcement Operations yield impactful results.

Spot the difference between PRE and NWPTIT

The North West Department of Community Safety and Transport Management strives to accelerate in delivering an effective and efficient public transport system in the Province. This, by ensuring proper regulation on public passenger transport, specifically the taxi industry through adjudication of taxi operating permits through the Provincial Regulatory Entity (PRE), which is established in accordance with the National Land Transport (NLT) Act 5 of 2009.

However, following the escalation of taxi violence which at some point led to loss of life in different parts of the Province, the Department MEC Sello Lehari deemed it fit to establish and appoint an intervention team, in line with section 10(1)(a) of the Act.



PRE functions:

- Monitor and oversee public transport in the Province

- Receive and decide on applications relating to operating licenses for intra-provincial transport

In the case where no municipality, the entity carries the operating license functions. The Act also makes provision for powers of the entity to make inquiries or hold hearings in appropriate cases to enable the entity to perform its functions.

The Act further provides a blueprint on how to deal with operator license applications, renewals, transfers as well as amendments.


Currently in the Province, the entity works with 84 transport associations who carry 16 632 active members.

NWPTIT functions:

- Receive and investigate cases
- Conduct route verification
- Intervene on conflicts

- Make recommendations on their investigation findings to the Department

Since the establishment, the team received 35 cases to attend and so far has resolved 29 of such. The team has adopted strategic approach to sustain stability on resolved cases is that the department took a posture of continuously monitoring and overseeing all resolved matters by entering into Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with SANTACO which is the highest national structure and the mouth piece of the sector.
